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MINISTER'S THOUGHT

THE HEAVENS ARE TELLING THE GLORY OF GOD

This psalm begins with the wonderful words, "The heavens are telling the glory of God". These words immediately make me think of the famous piece of music which has this title and is part of Joseph Haydn's Creation. It is considered to be one of his masterpieces, and is one of my favourite pieces of music to sing. The words are based on verses one to three of Psalm 19:

The heavens are telling the glory of God, the wonder of his work displays the firmament.

To-day that is coming, speaks it the day, the night that is gone, to following night. The heavens are telling the glory of God, the wonder of his work displays the firmament.

In all the lands resounds the word, never unperceived, ever understood. The heavens are telling the glory of God, the wonder of his work displays the firmament.

Haydn took an interest in astronomy and the discoveries of Sir Isaac Newton. These verses recall the story of creation and describe the heavens and the sky as proofs of God's creative work.

Over the last few weeks, thirty of us from across the churches in our villages, have been following a Lent course called 'Caring for Creation'. It is a discussion based course and is all about the environment

and climate change - and how our faith in God can make a difference. Through One of my favourite psalms is Psalm 19. the weeks we have been focusing on God's wonderful creation of planet earth and considered the place of humankind in it, and why it is under threat. There are many disturbing facts and figures about climate change, but we have also recognised some of the measures we can take to change our lifestyle in order to undo some of the terrible damage we have done and are doing to our planet. Many of us on the course are already making changes to our lifestyles which will reduce our carbon footprint, but we have decided that we can all do more to live our lives more thoughtfully - as well as recycling, and re-using we can try to eat less red meat, use our cars less, use environmentally friendly cleaning products, and choose Fairtrade and locally produced food. We have also considered

VILLAGE NEWS

BROADBAND FOR THE RURAL NORTH (B4RN)

The B4RN installation work has progressed at a fantastic pace. Dom and his crew expect to finish the whole village in May, two months ahead of schedule. Meanwhile, a small group of volunteers have coordinated connections from the pavement into individual houses, helping and advising homeowners in each section. Well over 100 households now benefit from a broadband service second to none in the country.

The B4RN project has brought further benefits to Halton. The Community Centre, St Wilfrid's School and St. Wilfrid's Church are now enjoying free service. The United Reformed Church will be connected soon as well.

B4RN is a not for profit organisation whose objective is to provide the fastest broadband infrastructure available in the world today to support local rural and semi-rural communities. The same

service level from a 'for-profit' commercial provider would be far more expensive, if available at all in such areas.

B4RN have chosen to share a portion of the DCMS government grant with the village. Because of this, £150 has been paid back from B4RN to the community for every connection that has gone live. Where volunteers have done the work on a homeowner's behalf, the money will be paid to a village fund to further benefit the resident of Halton. Householders who have completed the work themselves are entitled to the grant as a thank you from B4RN. However, some householders have generously donated it to the village anyway. Thank you to all who have done so.

Unfortunately, the government scheme will close to new registrations at the end of March 2021. Those already registered, who have validated their voucher, will still have the opportunity to claim the grant for the next 12 months from validation of the DCMS email.

CROOK O'LUNE BEAUTY SPOT GETS NEW LEASE OF LIFE AS A WILDFLOWER MEADOW

A beauty spot at the Crook O'Lune near Lancaster, known locally as Hermitage Field, is getting a new lease of life as a wildflower meadow.

A formal 12 year licence agreement has been finalised between Lancaster City Council, as owner of the site, and charitable residents' group, Hermitage Field Community Meadow. The agreement will allow the group to manage a five acre plot of land in the field on the council's behalf as a wildflower meadow.

Hermitage Field already contributes to the area being a popular place to visit, with car park and picnic facilities nearby, as well as stunning views across the Lune Valley. The remaining two acres at the centre of the field are already being managed under a separate licence by charity 'Life for a Life', as a memorial forest.

The Hermitage Field Community Meadow charity was recently set up by a group of local residents and has already acquired funding to help them create and manage the meadow. Work has begun on preparing the land before new planting can take place later in the year. The aim of the project is to develop an attractive and enhanced landscape at the popular site which will complement the new memorial forest.

The paths running through the site and parallel with the road will be retained and maintained to enable visitors to the Crook O'Lune to enjoy access to the field. Councillor Kevin Frea. Cabinet member for climate action and member of Crook O'Lune Advisory Committee, said: "The creation and development of a wildflower meadow at Hermitage Field by local people that are passionate about the conservation of this special place, has provided the council with another perfect opportunity to breathe new life into this treasured beauty spot. As well as looking incredibly attractive and complementing the natural beauty of the memorial forest on the same site, the new arrangement will also have massive ecological benefits. Introducing pollinating plants and enticing pollinating bees, insects and other wildlife to the site will increase biodiversity, as well as provide a local seed bank for other potential meadows. The arrangement also sup- .com" ports the aims of the council's new grassland management strategy which will

see changes to the way grass is cut in local parks and public spaces, again to help increase biodiversity and meet the council's climate change commitments." The initiative was spearheaded by local resident and trustee of the charity, Erica Sarney, who initially set up a group called the Community Pollinator Patches and went on to form the charity with a number of like-minded friends. Erica said: "We're very much looking forward to getting this exciting project off the ground and creating a stunning meadow teeming with wildflowers and wildlife for everyone to enjoy. Local people love this area so much and which is also part of a popular ramble overlooking the Lune Valley towards Ingleborough. We really hope everyone enjoys the meadow and may be inspired to come and join us, when restrictions allow, to help us bring it to life.

HALTON COMMUNITY HYDRO

This seems to be a good opportunity to review 2020, with all of the weather changes and a certain virus. It was a "swings and no steady roundabouts" year with two storms named Ciara and Dennis causing flooding in February and an eight week drought from mid April.

The hydro team is, however, getting better at draining down and removing stone. Following the prolonged heavy rain in early November, they installed the steel plates at the inlet, drained down and had the excavator on site and stone removed in less than two days. A matter now of what to do with a pile of rather high quality stone that we could pay to have taken off site and crushed to use on roads. It all comes from the river banking upstream that's seriously eroded to the point of losing the footpath, caused by exception-

ally high river flows impinging on that area of banking, after the bend in the river. My only request at the moment is that people don't throw the stones back in, as it does not take many to restrict the hydro outlet.

We also have the new flood defence barrier and gate between building and wall to prevent the high water flow from washing the stone into the river during the more serious floods. It should do the job, but have no real wish to test it.

The sunny weather was also a bonus in providing some relief from the Covid situation and the areas of exposed rock were well covered with bathing towels and sun worshippers — mostly socially distanced.

It was also good to see £9,375 of hydro support of community projects during 2020 via the Halton Lune Trust. We intend to list details on the LCD screen outside the hydro building, in addition to being provided on the Hydro Website. For shareholders, and indeed guests, the AGM is April 23rd 2021 at 7pm, by Zoom.

From Monday May 17:- The Centre and other village halls can open. We think that the majority of our regular user groups can return but there will still be some restrictions in place.

According to the Government roadmap from 21 June all restrictions will be lifted. We are keeping this in mind and are very hopeful that we can allow party bookings from then. I will wait until the next Prattle issue June/July to confirm this, as opening dates could have changed again by then.

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

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SQUARE DANCING

ABOUT SQUARE DANCING

Square Dancing evolved in America from immigrants sharing and amalgamating their own country's dances. It took off in England in the 1950s at American air bases.

The Square Dance moves have been standardised now, so that wherever you are in the world you will be able to dance, as it is ALWAYS called in English. Like many hobbies you can join in the fun and dance at the intake level of Social Square Dancing for as long as you wish. If you master it and feel you want more, you can go on to learn a higher programme, of which there are many. Previously we only recruited once every two years to allow our dancers plenty of time to practise before new people started again.

Lune Valley Ocean Wavers Square Dance Club is now pleased to announce that we will be changing the way we teach, which means we should be able to teach the basic moves in 12-16 weeks. We hope to recruit 3 or 4 times a year for Social Square Dancing (SSD), starting from Monday 6 September at The Centre @ Halton.

WHAT IS IT?

Unlike almost all other forms of dancing there is no footwork, each step is walked in time, to the beat of the music. There are no structured individual dances to learn, only the moves.

E.g., Sequence, Line Dancing, Scottish & English Country all have a sequence of steps or moves that make up a dance, which is repeated until the end of the music. You have to remember all the dances.

In Square dancing you learn the only the moves and the 'caller' blends the moves you have learned into a dance. Every time you get on the floor the dance will be different. The more moves you learn

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the more interesting the dances will become. In this way you can dance and have fun on the very first night. Remember how much fun a Ceilidh can be? That's week one.

Usually there are 2 parts to each dance. The first is the pattern or 'Patter call' Africar. It ceased trading in 1988. punous non xim like ceased trading in 1988 . using only the moves you have learned so far, until you are back at home with your original partner. This is followed by a singing call, which is more structured with some repeated sequences usually practised in the patter, but you don't have to remember them as the caller provides all moves to be danced a second or two before you dance it. The 'Singing call' is intended to be your reward for the work you have achieved in the patter, where you can sing along with the chorus if you know it and just enjoy the dance.

The 2 parts are known as a 'Tip', thought to be from when dancers tipped the fiddler/band in the past.

Social Square Dancing is Fun & Friendship to music. Suitable for all ages from 14yrs. I know some dancers who have been dancing since the 1950s and are The articles in The Prattle are provided now in their 80s and fit as fiddles. It keeps you supple, fit, and is an excellent

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A YEAR OF THE LUNE LOOP

On the day of the Prattle deadline for this edition, it was tipping it down, but that didn't stop me going for my daily 'Lune Loop' walk.

I started doing this walk regularly at the - bluebell, daffodil, forget-me-not, butbeginning of April last year. Actually I'd done it two or three times a week for a long time, but from 2nd April 2020, I've done it every single day, except for one day (when I went on another walk in Settle instead). So by 2nd April 2021, all being well, I'll have done it 365 times! When I first started doing it, to brighten up the day a bit I started livestreaming on facebook - my idea was, if people wanted to lie in, but fancied coming on a country walk, they could share in my early morning walk from the comfort of their own bed!

A few friends would join me each day, making comments about the walk in the 'chat'. In particular, two friends, Carol in Dorset and Tina in Cambridgeshire used to come nearly every day.

And Carol and Tina started teaching me the names of some of the plants we saw in those early days - because when I started, I think I knew maybe five plants

After a few weeks of livestreaming, and learning more plants from friends, my daughter said it was embarrassing! So I started doing it as a Zoom meeting, and pasting the meeting details on my facebook page so people could join me.

Again it was mainly Carol and Tina who joined in, plus another friend Kerstin who spent most weeks 'walking' with us. Kerstin and I both enjoyed learning plant names from Carol and Tina, who were really knowledgeable and who loved challenging themselves with new plants, chatting about the Latin names, and the species.

I think at the end of the season last year I'd learned about 75 different plant

I got quite observant noticing new plants coming out every week, I found it really exciting! It was also great to see the work done by Erica Sarney's group, having a wild flower area near Woodies with all the names marked on little slate markers... and having some of the flower names chalked on the cycle path down near the bridge.

After I'd done 33 days of walking, which was 100 miles, I set up a Justgiving page to raise money for the Trussell Trust, which supports food banks around the - on bikes, with dogs, with prams, on country, and campaigns to make food banks unnecessary. I added some funds to the page when I hit 500 miles - and rather amazingly I've now covered 1,000 miles on my daily Lune Loop, so have added some more funds. I think my favourite plant is the germand- under my own steam each day. er speedwell - it reminded me of little flowers that might be embroidered on to a little girl's cardigan - maybe I had a cardigan like that when I was little!

It's great that this month we're starting the 'plant year' again. We've already seen the snowdrops, this week I saw my first primroses on the path going down from Woodies to the cycle track, and the ramson/wild garlic are beginning to sprout everywhere. It looks so exciting, spring starting again.

As I said I've been doing this walk for a year now. There are quite a few regulars



their own.... and we all greet each other! I've managed to do it through every weather - snow, ice (despite slipping a couple of times on the bridge and by the hydro!), and even floods! It was impassable one day when the water was really high, and on that day I cycled at to Woodies and back along the cycle track, so I could say I'd got to Woodies

I'm very happy to say I've felt in great shape all year. About three years ago I was stuck on a sofa for two months with sciatica, and it's always latent there have been a few weeks when I've noticed the familiar ache, but it's never stopped me walking, and I'm back to pain free walks at the moment - having experienced the pain I am VERY appreciative of that. I had a cold one day and spent the morning in bed, but did the walk in the afternoon - and I've felt buoyant enough to get up and walk every day - there was one day when i

felt a bit rubbish in my head; I just set off slowly with no expectations, and suddenly realised that I'd nearly done the whole loop and I was feeling a whole lot happier.

I think doing this walk each day has been great for my mental health. Being grounded in my locality is new for me -I've had a job which involved travelling round Scotland every week for the last ten years, so sleeping in my own bed every day for a year is a novelty and very welcome. My cat likes it too!



REOPENING HALTON MILL – YOGA, PUBLIC ART AND HALTON HERITAGE

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PRINTING, TEXTILES, LIVING ART AND ANIMAL HEADS – AN OUT-DOORS EXHIBITION

Sarah Galloway, an architectural glass artist and printmaker based at the Mill, is holding a series of outdoor public art exhibitions in late April. She has been commissioned, with three other artists, to produce four simultaneous exhibitions in four different locations around the UK.

Each artist comes up with an idea of what they would like to produce using their own practice and expertise. They then create and share a set of instructions with their fellow artists, who will each make their own version of the others' art work.

So as well as producing her own 'Transmissive Imprints', Sarah is creating words using live, growing willow trees; using textiles dyed in traditional ways, to create a 'Diary of Lost Events'; and producing The Guardians — a set of animal heads made out of tetra packs. She will

be displaying all four exhibitions between 23 and 30 April. She's not totally sure of the location yet, but at least some of them will be near her studio on the river side of the Mill. Keep an eye on our website nearer the time for more information.

UNCOVERING OUR LOCAL INDUSTRIAL HERITAGE

If you are interested in the history of the village and the Lune Valley, you might want to check out a YouTube channel we have set up called Uncovering Halton Mill. 

MEMORIAL GARDEN IMPROVEMENTS

Halton Gardening Group has generously offered to help improve the Memorial Garden, which was donated to the village in 1935 by the Rev. Hastings, in memory of his parents and of his brother, Captain George Hastings, who was killed in action in France in 1915.

Their main objectives are to:

- Provide an appropriately attractive garden for the Village War Memorial. Improve the appearance of the Memorial Garden throughout the year.
- Consider the wider needs of the environment and nature.
- Make the garden sustainable and more manageable to maintain.
- Engage with, and encourage, community involvement in this focal point of the village.

Wherever possible, plants and bulbs have been chosen that are sympathetic to the time period, such as Rosa 'ax' (Latin for peace) which is a hybrid musk rose that was launched in 1918 to commemorate the end of WW1. Some of the older or larger shrubs will be either pruned or removed.



The Parish Council approved the plans in March, so HGG members will gradually progress the work over the forthcoming year, whilst continuing to raise funds for the work. COVID permitting they would also welcome offers of help.
