involved with the FOCC group six years ago when I was the Curate at Christ Church in Lancaster and accommodation was needed for an in-

terpreter. As we had a spare bedroom we volunteered to become hosts. Since then I have become a trustee of the group and my husband and I have continued to support the group.

The aim of FOCC is to relieve the suffering of children from the resounding after-effects of the 1986 Chernobyl nuclear disaster, which are still devastating families from the contaminated areas across poverty-stricken Belarus. The charity funds and organises yearly visits for Belarusian children from disadvantaged social backgrounds to the UK, temporary recuperative care. The charity targets particularly needy children medical attention, education, and ten-For most of us love comes from our par- der loving care. The children, come for month year for one every five consecutive years, and this has been shown to have a significant effect on their overall quality of life, their happiness, health and well-being. Each year one of the groups of children and their

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local families, including families in Halton. It has been a real blessing to see how the children who come as part of the programme have changed as a result of the love and care they receive during their visits. The biggest transformation I have seen has been with a set of twins. They are part of a large family living in a home, help them towards healing and wholewhich is little more than a shed with no indoor sanitation. I have vivid memories of them arriving at the Church Hall the first time they came to visit. Both very pale and tiny for their seven years of age, each clutching a small carrier bag with all their belongings in, their faces hidden under their anorak hoods, looking at the floor and not making eye contact with anyone. To begin with they were very shy and it took a lot of persuading for them to join in with any of the activities. During their visits over the past few years, it has been wonderful to see them gradually grow in confidence as well as become stronger and healthier because of the care and love they have received. As a result of taking part in the programme

their sporting talent has also been recognised and they are both now attending a specialist sports school.

Jesus gives us the commandment to 'love one another as I have loved you' (John 15: 12), and this points to the fact that the unique principle and driving force of the Christian life is love. We can often show love in very simple ways, a smile, a word of encouragement, a phone call, a card, a kind greeting, a gesture of support, a moment of attention, a helping hand, a present, a financial contribution, a visit... all these are little steps toward love, that can make life seem worthwhile to someone who is struggling. Sometimes giving love has the power to transform lives. The work of the Friends of Chernobyl's Children groups is a great example of how people can work together to make the unloved feel loved and to ness.

## **SCOUTS NEWS**

As a group we have finally been able to get back to meeting in person after 13 months. Beavers were the first back, followed by cubs a week later. As I am writing this article scouts will be going back tomorrow (12th May, 3 weeks later than Beavers), so I'm both excited and a little anxious. I'm not anxious about COVID itself, but about what scouts is going to look like with all the COV-ID restrictions currently in place, and how they will affect how we run scouts, although I'm hoping that things will soon be getting back to 'Normal' (whatever the new normal looks like). There has been an immense amount of work going on in the background in preparation for going back, both inside the hut and on our computers at home (in the form of endless Risk Assess-

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ments), but I'll be glad to be getting back to some proper scouting.

To negate the need for scouts to wear masks indoors we will be trying to do as much as possible outdoors, so we are really hoping for good weather over the next few weeks. For our first few meetings we will be finding out how COVID has affected each of us, trying out some new socially distanced games that don't require sharing equipment, a photo scavenger hunt around Halton and Orienteering in Williamson Park. As a group we have been fortunate that we own our own building as this allowed us to obtain some COVID related grants that have kept us going financially during the shutdown. Without these grants we would have been really struggling, as it is we are financially secure for the time being at least. Scouting nationwide has seen a significant reduction in youth, as well as adult, membership, and Halton is no different. We have seen reductions across all the sections, with youth numbers down by over a third overall, but we will be having a push to increase the numbers again once we are properly clear of COVID restrictions.

Beavers is the youngest section, for children approaching 6 years old up until around 8 vears, when they would move up to Cubs. ## **BIN LOCATIONS**


If you think there is a location that is clearly lacking a bin, e.g. for dog walkers, or one that rarely seems to be used then let me know and we can consider tweaking the locations.



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## **SQUARE DANCING**

## **SQUARE DANCING & COSTUMES**

The clothes we choose to wear are picked to suit the occasions we attend, be it casual, formal, uniform or costume. Our attire can lift our esteem, make us feel part of a team or help us get into character.

Most forms of dance have a costume that is either traditional or associated with it. We may smile at them as being antiguated but they are usually colourful and accepted as normal. Typical examples that come to mind are Morris Dancing with flowery hats, bells & ribbons, Highland with tartan kilts and velvet jackets, ballet with tutus and tights & Ballroom with suits and gowns. You may have seen Strictly Come Dancing. Without the costumes, the experience of the show, or display, would not have the same appeal for the audience and I am sure that the dancers feel really special in their outfits as well.

Lots of dancing styles have clothes associated with the dress of the era that the dance or craze started. A good example of this is rock and roll, which was huge in the 50s and is picked up in films like Grease, set in the 50s.

Square Dancing is no different. Like I mentioned previously, it took off in England in the 50s, in the American airbases, and was boosted by the then Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip being photographed Square Dancing in Canada.

Traditional "Square Dance outfits" look based in the 50s too. Ladies wear full petticoated skirts with a belt and a blouse. The men wear traditional long sleeved western shirts and a string tie. They are usually matching, either blouse & shirt or skirt & shirt. This is extremely useful for the caller, when trying to get the dancers back with their partners for the end of the dance and makes for a lovely colourful event. The costume has

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loosely followed fashion as skirts went very short in the 60s but now vary in length by individual choice. 50s style is very 'IN' at the moment so it has become quite fashionable again.

While costumes are no longer worn at club nights nor expected at dances, a dance flier may advertise 'Square Dance attire as optional'. Many experienced dancers love to dress up in their finery as they enjoy the swish of skirt work at

dances and sometimes on club nights as it adds to their personal enjoyment and experience of the dance.

Pre-loved outfits are regularly brought to club nights, usually proceeds to charity, in case anyone would like them.

In Square Dancing participating as a team, in the fun of the dance, is the important thing. As an individual, what you wear should help **you** feel confident and comfortable for the enjoyment ahead.

## **BLACKBIRD STORY**

Melodious springtime birdsong, especially from blackbirds, is more than welcome and is certainly cheery, although their desire to completely grub up my poor attempts at seedling cultivation certainly isn't.

It seems as though someone in the area, at some point, must have been taming blackbirds, as I have a story that began maybe 8 years ago, when to our amazement, a large magnificent female landed on our feeding table close to the back door and very quickly, without any encouragement from us at all, would snatch tit-bits directly from our fingertips. She was such a fine-looking bird that the only name appropriate to call her was 'Her Ladyship' (HL). Over the next few years this bird quickly became a daily visitor, always there first thing in the morning and, incredibly, would even fly straight to the feeding table when we called by making a clicking sound. If we did not feed her in a timely fashion, she was apt to hop up to the open kitchen door and stand there admonishing us for the empty bird table. A few sultanas soon appeased her.

On another year HL appeared with a male that was perhaps her partner? He was also equally tame and was easily recognisable because he had the habit of comically draping his wing feathers behind him so he almost looked like he was wearing a cloak, hence we christened him 'Darth'.

As the seasons changed both birds seemed to disappear and it must have

been 6 months later before we saw them both again. One day, out of the blue, Darth arrived and the following day HL flew back too. Both birds were thinner and physically very much different from the year before and seemed to have had a bad experience overwintering, wherever they had been.

The following year only Darth seemed to be around and was always fluttering around the window at breakfast time and, come nesting time, was always there looking for food and became quite a pest as he was obviously feeding young. As a reward though, he eventually brought several fat chicks to the garden where he would take tit-bits from us and then on to feed them.

Another year, regretfully both Darth and HL were missing and what should arrive but another male, equally as tame as the other two. He was a very scruffy looking blackbird and always had two feathers sticking up in odd angles so we called him 'Punk'. He was a little more apprehensive than the other two but still equally tame.

This is the end of my story but maybe someone else in the area has had an experience feeding descendants of these

three lovely birds.


#### PARKING AND SPEEDING
