REFURBISHMENT OF ST WILFRID'S PLAY AREA

Initial quotes have been received for refurbishing St Wilfrid's Play Area with the lowest starting at £47,000. The proposed list of new play items includes an inclusive roundabout, climbing net, toddler swings, junior swings, nest swing, stepping logs, roll 'n' rope, wobble board, clatter bridge and springers. The next stage is to explore how this could be funded, which will include identifying grants and, if necessary, a loan.

BINS

There are continuing problems with dog bins not being emptied around Halton. We have raised this problem several times with Lancaster City Council who are responsible for emptying them. The team manager is aware of the issue, so we hope that this will be resolved eventually. In the future, if you spot a bin overflowing

please inform the Clerk via email, or alternatively directly to Lancaster City Council.

Two new floor standing bins have been purchased and placed on Arrow Lane and in the ginnel between Penny Stone Road & Beech Road. These replace the dog bins that were removed.

TRAFFIC AND PARKING ISSUES

Many issues relating to traffic and parking have been reported to the

council or online over the years. The restricted parking in some areas, such as High Road, can result in damage to vehicles and obstruction to both vehicles and pedestrians. Highways are generally very reluctant to make any changes, so at the recent Parish Council meeting it was suggested that we start logging incidents and problems so that evidence can be gathered to persuade Highways that action is needed in some areas.

If you would like to help, then please email the Clerk with details of the issue or incident; this will be logged to build up evidence of issues in particular areas. This could cover obstructions to the road or footpath, damage to vehicles parked on the road, speeding, accidents or near misses.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN PROGRESS

The Steering Group has reviewed the comments from the formal Regulation 14 consultation which happened over the summer. The plan will be updated to reflect these comments ready for approval by the Parish Council at the December meeting. and submitted to Lancaster City Council for the Regulation 16 stage and a review by external Examiner. Finally, Lancaster City Council will organise a referendum of the parish to ask whether the plan is acceptable.

HALTON LUNE TRUST

A reflection from our Chair

Living in Lancashire, the rain is a constant companion, something we accept as part of our daily life. The rain, falling far away on the Howgill Fells in Cumbria, makes its way down the River Lune to Halton. Here, many years ago, water powered the Halton Mill as it now powers the Halton Lune Hydro.

The project for the Halton Lune Hydro was completed in 2015 and is truly inspirational. Whilst a major project, it is in many ways a simple process water flows down a pipe, turns a propeller which spins a fly wheel leading to a belt that drives a sturdy but modest generator, feeding electricity at a profit to the nearest houses and the National Grid. When you boil the kettle some of that electricity may well have come from the village's hydroelectric plant. The income from the Hydro covers its ongoing maintenance. provides а fair return shareholders, with the remaining profit coming to the Halton Lune Trust to enable grants, in accordance with its criteria, for the benefit of Halton and surrounding villages through the Halton Lune Trust.

During my time as a Trustee of the Charity I have seen two significant changes.

The first, improved clarity of its criteria which has enabled the Trust to support



for a small garden, a scheme for a new border, or a special feature. People like to see what you've done. Some participants may have plants for sale but you don't have to. We would like to get gardens confirmed by March if possible as we need to get the map ready in good time.

My garden was in the previous Safari. It's a working garden and we're constantly changing borders and beds, with occasional plant murdering going on. We compost what we can but the green bin has been full to the brim. It was interesting to chat to visitors and other people. Thev questions about the plants, the names of certain flowers, which fruit and vegetables we liked to grow, what worked best, any problems we had or new features that we had begun. Some people just liked to have a wander on their own, others walked round with us.

From January 2025, we are trialling a new meeting format for the Gardening Group. We will meet on the third Thursday of the month at 10:45am at the Red Door, for an informal discussion on gardening matters within the village and in our own gardens. We hope this will encourage more villagers

BEE HAPPY

One of the most popular plants with bees in my garden was my 'posh thistle', Cirsium rivulare 'Atropurpureum', which bears deep purple-red thistles on long stems, in contrast with spiny, dark green foliage. They flowered for months. I dead-headed them regularly, wearing gloves. Bees also enjoyed the dandelions, which I tolerated up to a point then hoicked some out.

Recently in a newspaper I read about a study on bees by University of Bristol researchers. They found that small patches of garden in rural areas offer a steady and reliable source of nectar for bees throughout the year, crucially in early spring and late summer when nectar from farmland is scarce. Dr

Thomas Timberlake, the study's author, said, "It's well known that gardens and urban areas can be great places for flies pollinators like bees. and butterflies." By making gardens pollinator friendly, and planting a variety of flowers that bloom year round, people can have a positive impact beyond their own gardens.

Their results found that pollinatorfriendly planting is more important than the size of a garden, giving every gardener an opportunity to contribute. They recommended planting nectarrich shrubs with complementary periods flowering and prioritising flowers with an open structure in late summer and autumn. Dr Timberlake said that gardens might be helping pollinators more than we ever realised. One study recommended the following flowers and shrubs for pollinators:

Early spring (March):

Hellebore, Pieris, Pulmonaria, Skimmia japonica

Mid to late spring (April-May):

Aquilegia, Ceanothus, Apple, Cherry, Ribes (currants)

Early to mid summer (June–July): Campanula (bellflower), Geranium (cranesbill type not pelargoniums), Lavender, Honeysuckle.

Late summer to autumn (August–October):

Echinacea purpurea (coneflower), Hedera helix (ivy), Oregano, Hylotelephium (Sedum), Verbena bonariensis

From observation I'd add chives and alliums, thyme, rosemary, foxgloves, Cirsium, and crocuses for early bees. It might be too late to buy crocus bulbs but some garden centres may have some in pots. If you want to plant a fruit tree, check the rootstock as sizes and growth can vary a lot, and a dwarf variety might be better. Personally I avoid the small campanula varieties as they can be invasive but I have a tall one which seems OK to control — so far. Nothing against pelargoniums, I like them for colour.

After reading those articles I wondered if our local university had any studies. They've been bee-keeping on the campus for some time now. With a bit of virtual digging I found that scientists at Lancaster University, in collaboration with the University of Reading, studied data on insect pollinators at solar parks in the UK, covering 15 sites. It showed that UK solar parks, if managed correctly, can provide vital resources to help stem the decline in the nation's

bees and butterflies. Whether you love or hate the idea of solar parks, this is a benefit that I wasn't aware of.

They recorded around 1,400 pollinators across more than 30 species, including nearly 900 butterflies, more than 170 hoverflies, more than 160 bumble bees, as well as moths and honeybees which is phenomenal! Parks with a wider varietv of flowering plants increased numbers of bumblebees. butterflies and hoverflies. The study also showed the number of flowering is less important to plants pollinators than having a variety of flowering species to forage across, the same as Bristol's findings. Blaydes, of Lancaster University, lead author of the study, said: "Pollinating insects such as bees, butterflies and hoverflies have been in dramatic decline in recent years and there is a need to restore more resources for these species in our landscapes." She also said, "We've shown that through management decisions such as planting a variety of flowering plants, solar parks can support insect pollinators and also those communities can be relatively diverse and abundant - particularly in those landscapes where there are few hedgerows and wildflowers pollinators to depend on."

TORRISHOLME CRICKET CLUB UPDATE


